SPEAKER:

AL ROGERS, U.S. Geological Survey

SUBJECT:

The Effects of Local Conditions on the Level of Strong Shaking, and the Prediction of These Effects in Los Angeles Basin.

AL will discuss seismic data composed of nuclear tests recorded on seismographs at 98 locations throughout the Los Angeles Basin. Studies indicate that local geologic conditions can alter ground motions in the time and frequency domain, that those effects can be predicted for different seismic events and geographical position, and that the effects of geologic conditions on ground motions from distant nuclear tests repeat the site response that occurs during strong earthquakes sufficiently to make this technique a useful means of site-effects predictions.

EDITORIAL

GEOMEDIA

Once again, the "geologist" is in the local papers being used as a pawn in a political spat. As usual, the media portrays the geological community as baffoons that either cater to developers, defend mountains, had all the answers all the time or had an ability to stop inevitable natural earth processes. This does not reflect the majority of the profession that diligently helps citizens by minimizing hazards, interpretating geologic problems, finding cost effective solutions, and limiting the risks associated with life in southern California. The consultant is faced with a difficult if not impossible task of predicting the future performance of the earth. He is handcuffed by a tight budget, little time, physical constraints, and a demanding public which heaps a tremendous amount of liability on him for which the geologist is unable to obtain reasonable insurance. A self-serving approach is to "call everything a landslide" or "tell them what they want to hear" but these do little to help an uninformed The geologic community can diagnose problems better than doctors and has a lower percentage of problems with projects than most professions. We have permitted ourselves to become the cause for natural processes. Our shortcoming is that we air our petty squabbles and academic differences in the media and not in our professional societies. Landslides will damage homes in the future and we will again see our profession in newsprint. If you have an opportunity, speak highly of the profession, explain our limitations and abilities and educate the public. Lets stop geologists from being the scapegoat for problems over which we have no control.


