SUMMARY OF ANNOUNCEMENTS

Norman R. Tilford, President of AEG and professor of geology at Texas A & M University, presented an excellent synopsis of the current state of affairs of AEG. The emphasis of Norman's talk was directed toward thoughts on restructuring the AEG membership classification. In addition, there was concern expressed that AEG may loose its character as an association of "Geologists". This could result because of the on-going interest and hard work by engineers involved with the association. Mr. Tilford complimented these individuals, but clearly expressed the need for the association, which was founded by working geologists, to remain a geologic organization which serves geologists.

Three motions were passed for the upcoming April Board of Directors Meeting of AEG in Denver.

IS IT OR ISN'T IT - HAZARDOUS? by Tom Mills

The Environmental Protection Agency has established regulations for all producers, handlers, tranporters, and disposal facilities dealing with hazardous waster (essentially from the cradle to the grave). The list of which materials are considered hazardous is extensive and various regulatory agencies even disagree on the classification of certain materials. The minimum insurance requirements established by the EPA for companies dealing with hazardous waste have closed many landfills. The nearest disposal facilities handling certain liquid hazardsous wastes are in Utah and Texas. The decline in the number of available facilities has led to a cost of disposal of one cubic yard of hazardous waste ranging from \$80 to \$150. Many former disposal sites around the United States have contributed to contamination of the environment. With the high cost of cleaning up old facilities, Superfund, which was estabilished by the EPA to provide funds for cleanup through taxes on petroleum and various chemical products, is essentially broke. Case histories presented focused on gas station tanks which were being removed for new development and were discovered to have leaked. The soils contaminated by gasoline can be classified as hazardous and special treatment or disposal is often required. In addition, extensive exploration may be required to determine the extent of down gradient contamination.




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
