STRUCTURE DESIGN AND RESPONSE TO STRONG GROUND MOTIONS

Ben I. Schmid, Consulting Structural Engineer will discuss the lateral strengthening of the south section of the Rose Bowl and the results of lateral motion due to the Whittier Earthquake, including interaction of portions of the stadium on fill and exit tunnels buried in fill with the free standing remainder of the stadium. Mr. Schmid will also discuss the repair and releveling to be undertaken at the Monterey Hills condominium building that has suffered major settlement damage. Projected causes together with methods and steps for correction will be discussed. Building code changes for condominium structures will be proposed.

Assembly Bill 2903 (Hansen) has been introduced in Sacramento to allow the landslide mapping activities of the Landslide Hazard Identification Program of the California Division of Mines and Geology to continue. If this bill does not pass the Landslide Program will terminate January 1, 1989.

CONGRADULATIONS

Congradulations to Scott Kerwin, Donald Clark and Jack Eagen of Moore & Taber for their part in the Cove Road Restoration project, Dana Point Harbor, California. The project has recieved recognition and honors as the project of the year from the California Geotechnical Engineers Association (formerly SAFEA) and the Orange County branch of ASCE and Orange County Engineering Council. The project has also been nominated to National ASCE for consideration as the Outstanding Civil Engineering Achievement Award, 1988. The Cove Road landslide occurred on a high steep slope, closed a major road to the Dana Point Harbor and threatened a prominent bluff top restaurant. Although the basic problem was geotechnical, the investigation, evaluation and ultimate repair required the cooperation and interaction of several professional disciplines and specialt construction firms. The restoration of the slope included an upper concrete restraining structure with tie-back anchors and a lower precast concrete crib type retaining wall.
